<b>Comments</b>	This curriculum has eight lessons. They have many extensions lessons that could be used across curriculum. Good media component. 1. The ABCs of Healthy Eating 2. Let's Get Physical 3. Teen Making a Difference (policy) 4. Advertising's Hidden Messages 5. It's in the Label--The Food Label 6. Have it Your Way Fast Food 7. Eating to Win 8. Making News: A Primer News Media. This is a good curriculum but there are not that many lessons which may be good considering the curriculum in school may be more difficult to add to.
	There are only 175 copies left of Jump Start Teens and they are not reprinting due to lack of funding. They are willing to work Chartwell to reprint, but the cost may be higher if only 500 are ordered. They will not reprint unless it is updated with new food pyramid and dietary guidelines--how to do this would be discussed between Chartwells and Project Lean. They do not provide teacher training but feel that many teachers are able to use this curriculum without training.
